Athletes in track and field had one goal for many years—to break the four-minute mile (1.61 km). Today, many people have accomplished this, but in the 40's and 50's reaching this goal seemed impossible. The record had been set in 1945 with a time of 4 minutes 1.3 seconds. Close.

Three men were going to try to challenge the record on May 6, 1954. The weather that day was not good for running. It was windy and rainy, but, nevertheless, the three men had decided they could set a new record. One wore glasses and looked like a schoolteacher. Another had red hair. The third man was tall with fair skin.

The rain stopped and at 6:00 PM, the three men came up to the starting line. When the starting gun went off, the man with the glasses took the lead with the tall man behind him. Half way around the track, the tall man shouted, “Faster!” They went around the track again with the same two men in the lead, but the one with the glasses seemed to be getting tired and he slowed down at the end of the second lap. The one with red hair came up with impossible speed and took the lead. The tall man still remained in second. The red-haired man was the leader for the third lap, but he too began to slow down. For the last lap, the tall man began running faster. He had rather long legs and they carried him faster and faster. He was also getting tired, and when he broke the tape, he fell into the arms of some friends.

The tall man was a medical student named Roger Bannister. The redhead was Chris Chataway and the one with glasses was Chris Basher. They were friends and had actually been practicing all winter with the aim of one of them breaking the four-minute mile. They had practiced in London running quarter-miles in 61 seconds. Finally, they went up to Scotland and ran quarter miles in 59 seconds. They had come to Oxford to see if they could do it.

They waited for the announcement, and at last a voice came over the loudspeaker. “Time for the mile: three minutes, fifty-nine point four seconds.”

The three friends began jumping up and down. They had done it. They had broken the record and ran the mile in 3 minutes 59.4 seconds. Since then many have broken that barrier, and indeed an Australian ran the mile in 3 minutes 58 seconds later in the same year. The present record stands at 3 minutes 43.14 seconds. Roger Bannister continued competing and set a record at 1500 meters. At the end of 1954, he retired from competition so he could finish his medical studies. He worked as a doctor and died in March 2018 at the age of 88.
